

St Andrews Church, Mells BA11 3PW

Grade I, 15C. Particularly fine exterior & glass, with highly decorated porch. Good example of Somerset four-stage tower. Churchyard burials of interest.



St Mary Magdalene Church, Great Elm BA11 3PW

Grade I, dates from 12C. In the 13C the Nave was lengthened, possibly when the tower was added around 1240.



Christ Church, Frome BA11 1EH

Grade II*, dates back to 1818. Beautiful architecture, stained glass windows and fine pipe organ.

Church of St Michael, Stoke St Michael BA3 5GT

Grade II*. Church has a western tower of c. 1400, the remainder being built in 1838 by Jesse Gane.



St Giles Church, Leigh on Mendip BA3 5QJ

Grade I, 13C. Magnificent tower and well decorated internal Nave & Chancel roof. Original pews still present.

St George, Whatley BA11 3LE

Grade II*, dates from 14C. Large spire and 14C effigy of Sir Oliver de Cervington, notable as an example of medieval armour.



Holy Trinity, Chantry BA11 3LJ

Grade I, 1846. Built for James Fussell of the Fussell Ironworks. 4-bay nave, lower 2 bay chancel; both with gargoyles and angel figures.



St Bartholomew Church, Cranmore BA4 4QJ

Built in 1470, chancel rebuilt in the 19C. The windows are particularly fine examples; restored in 1986. Fine tower.



Church of St Mary, Witham Friary BA11 5HF

Grade I, original building 12C. Altered in a transitional style in 1828, rebuilt & extended 1875. Three-bay nave, no aisle & unusual stone vaulting.



St Mary Magdalene, Upton Noble BA4 6AS

Grade II*, 12C but altered 16C and underwent Victorian restoration in the 1870s which included lengthening the Nave & Chancel.



The Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Batcombe BA4 6HP

Grade I. Rounded Norman chancel was rebuilt after 1250. Most dates from the 15C and 16C. East window - wonderful stained glass.



All Saints Church, Nunney BA11 4LW

Grade I, dates from 12C. It was probably built on the site of an earlier Saxon or Norman church from which a Saxon cross and Norman font can still be seen.
