

Letter from the Bishop of Bath & Wells Let's walk into the light

A story that's often told in our churches comes from the fourth chapter of John's Gospel. It tells of Jesus, in the blinding heat of midday meeting a Samaritan woman at the well in a town called Sychar. The woman is hoisting up heavy buckets of water in the hot sun. She's there because she's a woman with 'a reputation' and it's the only time of day she can avoid the muttering of her neighbours who meet at the well at cooler hours.

In an extraordinary encounter, Jesus sees deep into the woman's heart. Through their conversation Jesus brings about her healing and restoration into the community from which she is estranged. It's a story of life, possibility, new beginnings and forgiveness.

The woman at the well is not the only Biblical story set in Sychar. There's another, contained in the 34th chapter of the Book of Genesis. This is a tale of terror that's never heard in our churches; the rape of a girl called Dinah. It's a dark, nasty tale of violence that wrecks the life of individuals, families and the entire community. So we don't speak about it. We keep it hidden.

Sometimes people say to me of safeguarding 'It's just a tick box exercise', an onerous compliance requirement. Rather I would say that our work in safeguarding asks fundamental questions about the kind of places we want our churches to be. Just like the Bible passages I've mentioned, we can be places of hiddenness, silence, and hurt. Or places of life, new beginnings and restoration.

Accounts like the Makin review have shone light on our story. We've also been working hard to bring about change. While we cannot be complacent, I am intensely proud of all that was revealed about safeguarding in Bath and Wells by our independent audit that happened earlier this year. This told us that we are moving towards a much better story. So let's build on the momentum we have created. Let's walk into the light.

Fiona Gibson to become the next Bishop of Taunton

Downing Street announced on 22 October that Fiona Gibson will be the next Bishop of Taunton. She is currently the Archdeacon of Ludlow in the Diocese of Hereford, a role which she has held since 2021. Fiona was ordained deacon in 2011 and priest in 2012. She served her curacy and first incumbency in the Diocese of St Albans, before her appointment as Archdeacon of Ludlow.

Mendip Live Wires

At our October monthly meeting we welcomed some new visitors for the evening, it is always lovely to see new faces.



Our speaker was Emma Cambourne, a mindfulness teacher, who came to talk to us about how she had come to mindfulness about 12 years ago and the positive effect it has had on her physical and mental wellbeing. Emma had a stressful job which resulted in her feeling in a low mood with periods of anxiousness. She discovered a mindfulness course and enrolled on it and found it so helpful and therapeutic that she went onto train as a mindfulness teacher. Emma says we usually do not put our physical and mental health first before our roles of carer, wife, partner, mother and so we find ourselves 'at the bottom of the log pile'. Emma explained that mindfulness means being more aware of our feelings and needs.

Emma went on to give us a taster session with two simple meditation techniques. She explained mindfulness can help with memory, sleep patterns and relationships with other people. It also supports those with a range of psychological conditions including anxiety, depression, stress as well as physical conditions such as chronic pain. Emma works with children and young people as well as adults, either individually or in groups, virtually or face to face. To learn more about mindfulness see https://mindfulmewithemma.com

East Mendip Gardening Club

It's getting colder and wetter as we draw into November. Trees are putting on their autumn displays and winter stems start to come into their own. As autumn turns to winter, your main jobs in the garden are mostly about protecting plants and structures from the wilder weather to come but there is still sowing and growing to be done.

Insulate your outdoor containers from frosts. Use hessian or bubble wrap held in place with garden twine.

Prevent containers becoming waterlogged by raising them off the ground for the winter using bricks or 'pot feet'.

Encourage hungry birds into your garden by investing in bird baths and bird feeders. Our feathered friends will keep garden pest numbers down and bring joy on a bleak winter's day.

Protect roses from wind-rock by pruning them by one-third to half their height. This will stop them swaying in strong wind and prevent roots coming loose in the soil.

Remove fallen leaves from around the base of any rose bushes which suffered from blackspot or rust this summer, to reduce the chance of reinfection next year.

Continue to lift dahlia tubers, gladiolus corms and begonias tubers to store dry over the winter months. Remove the dead foliage before storing.

Cut back the yellowing foliage of herbaceous perennial plants, and lift and divide overcrowded clumps to maintain their vigour.

Cut a few stems of holly with berries for making Christmas garlands. It's early, but now's the time to do it before the birds eat all the berries.

Stand them in a bucket of water in a sheltered spot where birds can't take them. Lift parsnips after the first frosts, when their flavour will have sweetened.

Prepare a perennial vegetable bed to plant up with rhubarb plants and asparagus crowns

Keep planting onion, shallot, and garlic sets. Dig over heavy soils adding organic matter before planting.

Place a scaffold plank on the ground along the main access route into your plot. This allows access but prevent the soil compacting as you walk across it.

Spread well rotted farm manure across the surface of your vegetable beds to rot down over winter.

Plant bare root currant and raspberry plants now, while they're in their dormant state.

Apply grease bands to the trunks of fruit trees to prevent wingless female winter moths climbing the trunks and laying their eggs in the branches.

Install solar lights in the greenhouse so you can still get out there on dark winter evenings to check your plants.

Plant up a terracotta pot of hyacinth bulbs for a highly scented and colourful display next spring.

Sow pea 'Meteor' and hardy broad bean 'Aquadulce Claudia' outdoors in rows for extra early harvests in spring.

Plant autumn planting onion, shallot and garlic sets.

Plant asparagus crowns now. Growing these expensive spears yourself will save you money and produce a crop with superior flavour.

Plant out spring cabbage plants at the beginning of the month.

Sow winter salads in a greenhouse or outdoors under cloches. Choose types that don't require extra heat like lettuce 'Winter Gem', winter land cress, purslane, and corn salad.

Plant blueberry plants this month. Blueberries prefer a slightly acidic soil, but do very well in patio containers with ericaceous compost if your garden soil is not acidic.
