Letter from Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath & Wells

Human flourishing for all

‘Tell me about your school days’ is a deeply illuminating question to ask. Our experience of school shapes us deeply our whole lives long. Schools mould our character and values. They develop our skills and expectations. They influence our relationships and our life chances.

Rooted in our understanding of the Bible, Christians have been involved in schooling for many centuries. In the nineteenth century, the Church of England’s National Society set up thousands of schools all around our country, established principally for the benefit of the poor. It is largely out of this heritage that our Diocese of Bath and Wells continues to have a stake in so many of Somerset’s schools today. We have 180 Church Schools, the majority of which are for primary aged children, with nine middle, upper or secondary schools and one specialist provision. Big and small, and found in all kinds of communities, our schools educate around 60% of Somerset’s primary school children.

Our schools are Church Schools, they are not faith schools. We are open to everyone, of all faiths and none. Our schools are guided by our Christian ethos, manifested in their engagement with the Bible and worship, in prayer and Christian ethics. More recently, this is expressed most fully in the Church of England’s Vision for Education. This understands our schools’ mission to be ‘deeply Christian, serving the Common Good’. Our vision embraces the spiritual, physical, intellectual, emotional, moral and social development of children and young people. Our vision is of human flourishing for all.

As bishop, I am privileged to spend lots of time in our Church Schools. The most fun I have is being grilled by young people who pose me questions about ethics and doctrine, our Church’s life and faith. I’m certainly kept on my toes! What I value most is seeing played out in our young people the four main elements of our Church’s vision - wisdom, hope, community and dignity. These commitments are reflected in the stories told in this edition of Manna. I hope you’ll enjoy reading them as they illustrate our vision for education in the schools of our diocese.

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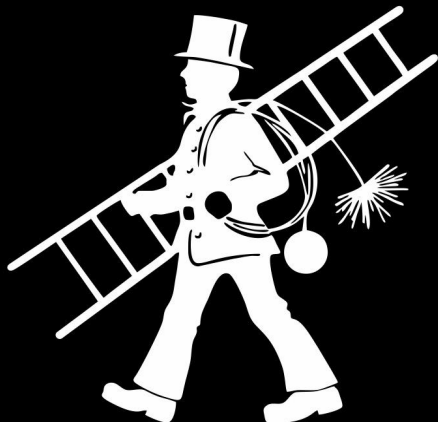

New Archdeacon of Wells

Jo Stobart is to be the next Archdeacon of Wells and Residentiary Canon of Wells Cathedral. She will succeed Anne Gell who stepped down earlier this month after nine years in the role. Jo will be returning to Bath and Wells in the late autumn.

Bishop Michael said, “I am thrilled that Jo is coming home. She is someone with huge ability, who loves our diocese, loves Somerset and rural ministry. I am absolutely delighted to welcome her back with us as the new Archdeacon of Wells.”

Speaking on her appointment, Jo, who is currently Chaplain to the Bishop of Exeter, said, “I am overjoyed and honoured to be the next Archdeacon of Wells and Residentiary Canon of Wells Cathedral. The call to serve in this role was a tug at my vocational heart strings that I could not ignore.”

“There will be much for me to learn, but I am looking forward to supporting the parishes of the Wells Archdeaconry, getting to know its people and places, and joining in with the joyful mission of the Cathedral. My husband Ian is a Reader and, as someone whose ministry began as a lay chaplain, I am a passionate advocate for shared ministry and finding ways in which we can further enable all God’s people to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. The golden thread running through my whole working life has been teaching and learning, especially with children and young people, so I’m looking forward to finding ways to bring that focus to my new role.

“On a personal note, I was enjoying singing lessons in Ilminster before we moved to Exeter, so I’m hoping I might persuade someone at the Cathedral to teach me how to sing the Eucharistic Prayer!

Toby Wright, the Dean of Wells, said of Jo’s appointment, “With a love of the area, and a wealth of skills, we are richly blessed that Jo will be becoming a part of our praying community and serve on Chapter. From a diverse and gifted field, Jo was clearly the right person to come and work with us at the Cathedral, and across the diocese and it will be wonderful to welcome her, and her family among us.”

Jo was born and grew up in West London. Following a degree and postgraduate study in history in Yorkshire, Jo trained as a primary school teacher and taught at schools in the southeast. She set-up and ran Southwark Cathedral’s Education Centre. Having taken time out to focus on looking after her three now grown-up sons, Jo then moved with her family to Bath and Wells in 2006. She later became Lay Chaplain at the Kings of Wessex Academy in Cheddar, and it was during her time in this role that she entered the discernment process. After part-time training

at Sarum College, Jo was ordained deacon at Wells Cathedral in 2016.

Following a curacy in the Yatton Moor Team Ministry, she served as Vicar of Ilminster and Whitelackington, as well as Assistant, and then, Area Dean of Somerset South. During this time, she also studied for an MA in Theology, Imagination and Culture at Sarum College.

Jo has represented Bath and Wells on General Synod, the national assembly of the Church of England since 2021. In 2022 was elected as a central member of the Crown Nominations Commission, the Church of England body that considers diocesan bishop vacancies, and candidates for appointments to them.

In 2025, Jo moved to Devon to take up the post of Chaplain to the Bishop of Exeter. In this role she is part of the Bishop's Senior Staff. She has retained permission to officiate (PTO) with Bath and Wells.

In her spare time, she enjoys gardening, the arts, walking the family dogs and spending time with loved ones.

THE PERSECUTED CHURCH AND HOW TO SUPPORT IT

We take a look at certain countries in the world which in recent times have observed increases in violence and hostility towards Christians.

Globally, 388 million Christians now face high levels of persecution. Syria was the only newcomer to advocacy agency Open Doors' top 10 most dangerous places to be a Christian in its 2026 World Watch List. For the 2026 report there were verified to be at least twenty-seven deaths of believers for faith-related reasons. A Christian pastor in Damascus has spoken of the general atmosphere of extremism in the country.

Sub-Saharan Africa accounts for 93% of all Christians murdered for their faith globally. In Nigeria, there have been thousands of faith-related killings and abductions perpetrated by militant groups. Along with Sudan and Mali the country has the maximum score for violence by the Open Doors methodology. There are multiple complex factors contributing to this, from instability and insurgency to weak governance. Christians have been left vulnerable and subject to violent attacks from extremists.

In Nicaragua, the regime has increased its targeting of Christians who refuse to demonstrate political loyalty. This reflects an intensifying pattern of pressure aimed at silencing dissent, which encourages self-censorship among church leaders and members.

East Mendip Gardening Club

July brings long, warm days that continue late into the evening — perfect for pottering in the garden after work, hosting barbecues, and enjoying your beds and borders as they reach their peak.

Summer can still throw out a few surprises — make sure tall plants and climbers are well supported in case of bad weather.

Water at dusk to reduce evaporation and use mulch to retain moisture around plants.

Terracotta pots are prone to evaporation so dampen the pot down to keep roots inside cool and damp.

Keep an eye on your newly-bloomed hydrangeas for hydrangea scale - a sap-sucking insect that can affect growth.

Divide clumps of bearded Iris so they have time to form roots and flower buds for next year before the cold weather arrives

Look out for clematis wilt. Symptoms include wilting leaves and black discolouration on the leaves and stems. Cut out all affected material and dispose of it in your household waste.

Train cucumber stems upwards to make the most of the space available. Simply tie in their long stems to vertical wires or use cane supports to create a wigwam of poles.

If you're growing aubergines, pinch out the growing tip once they have 5 or 6 fruits. Pick fruits while they are young. You can expect to start harvesting mid to late summer.

Nip off the growing tips of squash and courgette plants to encourage branching.

Resist the temptation to harvest more rhubarb stems. Leave the stems in place; this will allow the plant to build up reserves for next year.

If you have plants fruiting in containers, make sure you give them a high potash liquid feed to keep them healthy and productive.

Maximise your fig crop by pinching out the tips of side shoots after they've developed five leaves.

Look after your aphid eaters — ladybirds, hoverflies and lacewings feast on greenfly and blackfly so it's worth protecting them.

If your plants are wilting for no obvious reason, check for vine weevils by tipping your plants out of their pots and looking for 'C' shaped creamy maggots amongst the roots. Treat with nematodes if vine weevils are spotted.

For flowers that bridge the gap between spring and summer, grow

biennials such as forget-me-not, foxglove 'Alba', sweet William and beautifully scented wallflowers for flowering next year.

Make your last direct sowing of beetroot now in time for an autumn harvest.

There is still time to direct sow fast-maturing carrots.

Sow fast-growing herbs such as coriander, dill, and parsley directly into the ground or into containers.

Sow French beans and runner beans if space allows — this will extend your cropping season well into the autumn. Direct sow or start them off in small pots. Expect to start harvesting in late August.

For something more unusual try kohlrabi — direct sow it now for a crop in approximately 8 weeks.

Make your last sowing of peas outdoors now so that they develop before the frosts.

Add colour to stir-fries with raddichio. Seeds can be sown directly into the soil now.

Direct sow salad leaves regularly throughout the summer. Pick the leaves when small and remove any spent plants. Expect to start harvesting in three weeks.

Spring cabbages should be sown now in a well prepared seedbed for transplanting later.

Make a note of your garden's pros and cons at its peak to remind you of any changes that you need to make for next year.

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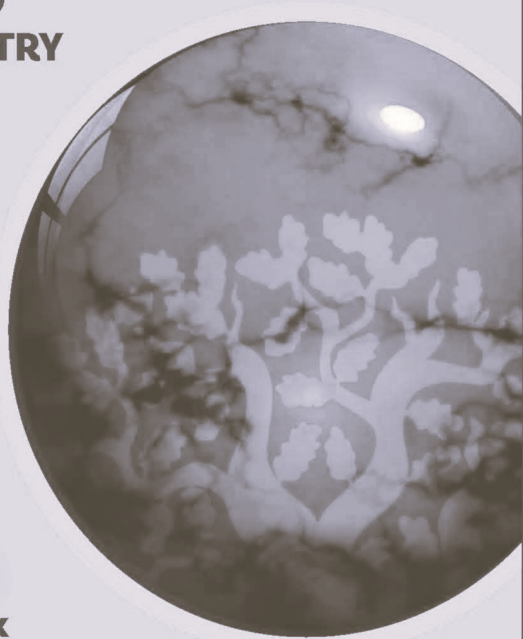

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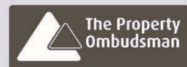
